How Do We Teach Children – The Church's stance on cremation? Cremation was formerly forbidden by the Church because it was promoted years ago, especially in Europe, by groups who used cremation to argue against faith in the resurrection of the dead. How could God possibly collect all those ashes and smoke together to make us rise again?! While no longer forbidden by the Church, we have norms about the care, placement and treatment of ashes because these affect the ability of mourners, especially children growing in faith, to grieve with hope. The Church encourages and prefers bodily burial in a grave or tomb, as the Lord Himself willed to be buried, for spiritual reasons. We all need to say goodbye; we all need reminders of Jesus' death and resurrection in which we hope to share as we gather in the presence of a beloved's body at visitation, bring their body with us one more time to Mass, and, at last, tuck the body into a grave for peaceful rest until the great day which we look forward to, the day of resurrection and reward, finally comes. These experiences make tenets of our faith more memorable and touching, especially for children who learn more by what is seen and done than words alone. When cremation is chosen, the Church highly recommends use of a classic funeral urn, asks that the ashes be placed in a grave or a niche in a mausoleum known as a columbarium (not scattered or kept in possession of the family), that human ashes not be divided among several recipients or be mixed with those of another individual or pet (out of respect for the integrity of the deceased as a special individual). While cremation is, of course, an individual choice, I suggest that families should be sure that they, their children included, are psychologically and spiritually comfortable with these arrangements. While funerals do honor the deceased and respect their wishes, funerals must also help the living to learn to grieve rightly and with hope!

From the Team Moderator's Desk (Father Rick):

Lent Begins on Ash Wednesday – March 6, 2019 with Masses at NOON and 7PM.

Clergy Abuse Crisis – Despite having mechanisms, protocols and policies in place to prevent, report and deal with the allegations of clergy sexual misconduct, the problem is not something that will be easily fixed and will take our Church at least one or two generations to get through. This is especially true as religion has been marginalized in our secular culture that has an increasingly large percentage of un-churched people; this sin and scandal only serves to add to the lack of respect and credibility people place in the Church. The Charter for the Protection of Children & Young People (commonly called the Dallas Charter, approved by US Catholic Bishops in 2002) has done so much good that the rate of allegations among our clergy has slowed to a trickle, from a high nationally in the US of 1,367 between 1970-74 to only 22 between 2015-17. The Charter, when fully implemented and followed, is working! Over two million children, millions of parents, 4 million volunteers, and all clergy have undergone safe environment training. When allegation of decades of abuse by Archbishop Mc Carrick surfaced this past summer, followed by a release of a report by a Pennsylvania grand jury that investigated 70 years of abuse in six of that state's dioceses before the 2,000s, what we see is a failure by some bishops to fully implement and follow the Charter with accountability, openness and transparency. That the Charter which applies to all priests and deacons must be revised to include all bishops as well is now eminently clear; we cannot expect enforcement from bishops among themselves without significant lay involvement and support for a universally binding mechanism to deal with allegations made against a sitting bishop. Civil authorities in some states have announced investigations and are demanding records, insisting that bishops make all abuse cases public; records of all cases in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee have been open since July 09 of 2004 as our Archbishops, then Timothy J. Dolan, now Jerome E. ListECKI, mandated full compliance with this portion of the Dallas Charter during our Chapter 11 Reorganization. For those who ask "Didn't we fix all this?" I can only say that we don't stop working on this. A sign of the Church's determination to get this right was the recent laicization and dismissal, without appeal, from the clerical state of former Archbishop Mc Carrick. This may be a signal from Pope Francis about the seriousness he will expect as the bishops of the world gather with him in Rome to address this sinful scandal at meetings February 21-24. We can't let this crisis lead to a crisis of faith because our faith isn't in a particular priest, deacon, bishop, pope or the Church as an institution. Our faith is in Jesus Christ. The Church as a community of disciples has undergone periods of scandals and low points throughout our history; through the promised gifts of the Holy Spirit hell's gates have not prevailed as each time we have emerged chastened, renewed and strengthened. We will continue to be frustrated until we know that our leaders totally get the gravity of these sinful situations, place victims always at the center of our concern, and remain ever-vigilant against any and all misconduct. It will get fixed when we work together as if everything depends on us, praying as if everything depends on God ... because it does!
