LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

The Gospel clearly tells us that true power is found in the embrace of virtue - living lives of non-violence, mercy, and forgiveness. Yet, we still are not convinced and seek things that will hurt us and retaliate against those who harm us. When Jesus faced temptation, he found security in who he was, which firmly rooted him in his mission and gave him the determination to trust in God. We, too, must learn to find security in our identity as a son or daughter of God, to live out our mission rooted in that truth, and to be confident in God's abiding presence.

From the Team Moderator's Desk (Father Rick):

How Do We Teach Children – How to genuflect, what it means, and why people bless themselves before the reading of the Holy Gospel?

Genuflection – the bending of one or both knees as an act of reverence upon entering church or when encountering Our Lord present in the Holy Eucharist upon the altar, in the tabernacle, in the monstrance or in a pyx – is a time-honored liturgical gesture mentioned as early as in the Psalms (Psalm 95:6). Genuflection happens to be the act of reverence Catholics of our time and country are most accustomed to, but a profound, devout bow can be equally reverent. Until about 300 years ago, bowing was the common way of showing reverence for the Eucharist or to a crucifix. It was considered quite proper, in fact, and in former times, for young girls to “curtsy” to the Blessed Sacrament. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal gives some idea of the proper signs of reverence in a church today and, for the most part, these directions are available in the Mass participation aids found in our Breaking Bread Hymnal. My recommendation for parents and children is to encourage at an early age a full, intentional genuflection, dropping the right knee entirely to the floor (honoring Jesus who is seated at the right hand of the Father), pausing to make the sign of the cross, only then rising politely to take a seat for Mass, remembering to genuflect before leaving, too! Sometimes children and families are in such a hurry to get seated for movies and sporting events that they don't entirely take in the special character that our places of worship have, as the emphasis in church is not on them but on God Who loves us and made us. Getting a family to church in time for children to make this gesture intentionally can make a deep impression on them. I remember a little boy once telling me that one of his favorite things to do at Mass was genuflecting and kneeling because, as he saw it, even his mom and dad had somebody to whom they had to kneel down and honor! As to **reverences** in church done by priests/deacons, along with kissing the altar, they also kiss the Book of the Gospels after they read from it. Before reading the Gospel, they bless their heads, their lips and their chests (hearts) with small signs of the cross; the people should be doing the same, making small signs of the cross on their foreheads, their lips and their hearts as a prayer that the Good News of the Lord they are about to hear may be always on their minds, on their lips and in their hearts. Do it slow enough for children to observe and do themselves – “May the Lord be on my mind, on my lips, and in my heart.”

The Devil – Has been called the “Father of Lies” but yet in the late 20th and early 21st centuries I sometimes feel that we've been doing much of his work for him! While our human technological advances like the powerful internet are “morally neutral,” sin or virtue enter the picture when we choose how to use and how to relate through them. It is a source of good humor for comedians to note the highly idealized versions of ourselves that we present as real online, in chat rooms, on employment or dating services. We choose to live virtually rather than enjoying the real lives given us by God. I suspect the devil also has a finger in marketing. Did you ever notice how many advertising slogans make pseudo-supernatural promises? “There are some things money can't buy; for everything else, there's (a certain credit card).” It's not quite God, but marketing makes it sound like a fair substitute. How about “A diamond is forever?” or “(A certain soft drink) adds life?” Make this a good Lent by learning from Jesus how to resist temptations that can be obvious or subtle and, like Him, trust “The one true God – accept no substitutes!”

Judge Not – *“I was shocked, confused, bewildered as I entered heaven's door, not by the beauty of it all, nor the lights or its décor. But it was the folks in heaven who made me sputter and gasp – the thieves, the liars, the sinners, the alcoholics and the trash. There stood the kid from seventh grade who swiped my lunch money twice. Next to him was my older neighbor who never said anything nice. Herb, who I always thought was rotting away in hell, was sitting pretty on cloud nine, looking incredibly well. I nudged Jesus, ‘What's the deal? I'd love to hear your take, on how all these sinners got up here; there must be some mistake. And why's everyone so quiet, so somber, give me a clue.’ ‘Hush, my child,’ Jesus said, ‘they're all in shock. No one thought they'd be seeing you!’”*
