From the Team Moderator's Desk (Father Rick):

St. Patrick – Although he died in 461AD and was renowned as a local saint by the 7th century, a feast day in his honor was first made national and added to the annual Catholic Liturgical Calendar in the 17th century. While legends and a popular imagination have created abundant customs associated with him, revelers may be surprised to learn that he never drank green beer (not even a Guinness), never ate corned beef and cabbage, never drove snakes out of Ireland, and is not a familiar friend of leprechauns! When we strip away the layers of enjoyable secular mythology, we find a holy person – a saint – who spent over 30 years successfully proclaiming the gospel message, the gift of faith to the people of Ireland. Born to a Roman family in Britain, he was raised nominally as a Christian; when kidnapped and carried off, he was sold as a slave to a landowner whose flocks he tended for six years. During this time, he began to pray and take his Christian faith seriously. At age twenty-two he dreamt that he was to escape captivity and return to his homeland; believing this dream to be heavenly, he walked for twenty days nearly 200 miles to the sea whereupon he found a ship going to France and took it. Eventually finding his way back to his family, he continued to dream of a return to Ireland as a missionary. This took him about 20 years as people thought him demented for wanting to go back to a place and a people who had enslaved him, a place considered the end of the known world and populated by barbarians! He endured setbacks and suspicions. There were already small groups of Christians scattered about in Ireland and, in 431AD, Pope Celestine I sent Bishop Palladius to organize and shepherd them; within a year he either died or returned to Europe due to hardships. This was Patrick's opportunity; he was elevated to bishop and sent with several assistants to minister to the few Christians of Ireland and to evangelize people dismissed as heathens by most of the world. Ireland was tribal, without cities; tribes were ruled by local kings; everyone lived off the land, beholden to a king, and few, if any, had ever heard the name Jesus Christ. Patrick had to obtain many a royal permission so he would be allowed to preach to the people; he also had to ask for land on which to build a church in each kingdom that he visited. Knowledge of the language helped him, but pagan religions filled with superstitions presented difficulty; at least several times he and his assistants were captured but were never harmed. Patrick did not attack the culture but used it to attract people to Christian faith; legend says that shamrocks were sacred plants to pagan Druids whose idea of religion included evil spirits, reincarnation, and human sacrifice; Patrick used it to explain the Trinity! His work had results: thousands of people were baptized, 300 bishops were ordained, and hundreds of churches built; he organized Christianity that had already existed and converted so many pagan kingdoms that it can be said that an entire nation became Christian through him! Pope St. John Paul II said: "In the history of evangelization, the destiny of an entire people was radically affected for time and eternity because of the fidelity with which St. Patrick embraced and also proclaimed the Word of God, and by reason of the fidelity with which St. Patrick pursued his call to the end."
