Memorial Day Thoughts - An encyclopedia says that "memory is the capacity of reproducing in consciousness the different experiences that belonged to it previously but that became unconscious." Memory always implies relation to time. Its importance in life is commonly recognized: without memory, we would inevitably be subjected to the tyranny of the present; all our activity would be determined by instinct and response to stimuli. Consequently, we would make no organized efforts to adapt ourselves to the changing circumstances of existence; in brief, without a memory, there would be no real progress! While remembering the sacrifices of veterans, living and deceased, and remembering them in such a way as to cherish what it truly takes to lead to peace, let's also be thankful for the gift that is memory itself, for without being able to vividly recall honorable experiences as well as both the pleasant and the most difficult ones, we could not resolve to move forward in hope and our lives would be touched by a fatalism inappropriate to people of faith in a God Who always was, always is, and always will be. Our memory and ability to compare present trends with past experiences to seek approaches to future needs are blessings we pray always be guided by the Holy Spirit. Have a blessed Memorial Day weekend!

The Ascension of the Lord – Will be observed at Sunday weekend Masses, June 01-02, 2019. Only the ecclesiastical provinces of Boston, Hartford, New York, Newark, Omaha & Philadelphia have retained the observance on Thursday, May 30; all other US ecclesiastical provinces, including Wisconsin, transferred observance to the 7th Sunday of Easter.

The 2019 Catholic Stewardship Appeal – Most recently reports that we have achieved 83.86% of our \$33,000 goal as, to date, we have given/pledged \$27,673, this by 66 donors representing nearly 25.38% of our registered parishioners; I am most grateful and thankful – this is the earliest we have been this close to our goal; the generosity of our parish is amazing! Archdiocesan-wide, 22,738 donors have gifted \$5,512,873.63 toward overall goal of \$7.8 million, ahead of last year's pace in gifts received but slightly behind in the number of donors, so please remember that every gift is a significant participation; no matter the size of your gift, you are worthwhile – thank you, again!

Abortion Debate – With the recent passage of more restrictive abortion laws in several of our states, the debate on it will intensify in public sectors, with many voices weighing in, both pro and con, especially as to what, if any, exception considerations could be legally or morally permissible, these conversations, many of them intense, will share a similar aim: reconsideration of Roe v. Wade by the US Supreme Court. From the point of view of our Catholic teaching, it is a poor law as human life must be respected and protected absolutely from the moment of conception. From the first moment of existence, every child is a human being and, as such, must be recognized as having human rights, among which is the inviolable right of every innocent being to life. Some equivocate. They recognize a baby as "human" but question whether a baby is a "person" until certain further developmental stages: many arguments follow. However, history demonstrates that we only question the personhood of someone we wish to use or to harm: Native American relocation, Black American slavery, Nazi holocaust. To question the personhood of others attempts to exclude them, thereby denying their rights with a diminished feeling of guilt or responsibility. Catholic teaching, on the other hand, is emphatic about being inclusive. A most emotionally laden argument will be from some women's rights advocates - "Even if it is a baby, it's still my body, my choice!" Just because we have power over someone does not give us any right to hurt someone. Those with power should not be able to oppress the weak just because they can; and a baby has its' own body – as far as I know, none of us has an extra head or eight extra limbs over and above our very own; responsibility, decency and maturity demand that we take great care of what is not our own and belongs to another.
